Emergency Services

Where can I find emergency food?

Greater Chicago Food Depository provides information on food pantries and meals in your area. Go to http://www.chicagosfoodbank.org/ and use the program finder tool. Or call 773-247-FOOD (3663). Another website to help you find food panties, soup kitchens, and meal programs close to you is www.direct2food.org.

I left home due to a crisis. Where can I find a safe place to go?

Look for restaurants, small businesses, fast-food restaurants, and community-based organizations that display the yellow and black diamond-shaped Safe Place logo. You can ask for help at one of these locations and a youth worker will be sent help you determine available options and services. If you are a teen in crisis you can also text the word "SAFE" and your current location (street address, city, and state) to 69866. You can also call the National Runaway Safeline (NRS) at 1-800-RUNAWAY (1-800-786-2929) for support and resources. NRS also has an online, live chat through its website, www.1800runaway.org.

I'm under 18 and I need emergency shelter. How can I find a place to stay?

Comprehensive Community-Based Youth Services (CCBYS) provides 24-hour crisis intervention for homeless minors. CCBYS will find you a place to stay. Call 1-877-870-2663.

I'm 18 or older and I need emergency shelter. How can I find a place to stay?

Dial 3-1-1 from a police station or hospital or go to 10 S. Kedzie to be placed in an overnight shelter. You can also try to secure a spot at one of the overnight youth shelters for youth, ages 18-24. Services are first come, first serve or lottery based. If accessing emergency shelters through 311, you may request youth-specific housing options during the Catholic Charities intake if beds are available.

Health

Where can I go for health care services?

The Chicagoland LGBTQ Services Directory (see Online Resource Guides below) provides health, mental health, prevention & wellness, and substance use listings. Howard Brown Health Center, located at 4025 N Sheridan Rd (773.388.1600) is the Midwest's largest LGBTQ health organization. You can find federally qualified health centers at http://findahealthcenter.hrsa.gov/Search_HCC.aspx. Some schools also have School-Based Community Health Centers - you can ask your school's STLS Clerk or Liaison for assistance locating a health center.

I'm not living with a parent or legal guardian. Do I need signed consent from my parent in order to see a doctor? Unaccompanied minors 14-18 years old can access basic healthcare without a signed parent consent form if they do not live with a parent or legal guardian, are not dependent on a parent or legal guardian for material support, and not under protective custody, temporary custody, or guardianship of DCFS. You must be identified in writing by one of the following: a school homeless (STLS) liaison or social worker, an adult relative, a representative of a homeless service agency, a social service agency providing services to at risk, homeless, or runaway youth, an Illinois attorney, or a representative of a religious organization.

I'm not living with a parent or legal guardian. Can I apply for a medical card on my own?

Yes. You are only required to apply for Medicaid with a parent or relative if you are living with that person. If you are a minor and living on your own, you should provide proof of that fact such as a letter from a homeless service provider, the person you are living with, or from your school. It is also a good idea to have a social service agency or legal advocate help you apply. Are there gender identity services available in Chicago for young people under 18 and their families?

Drop-In Centers and Street Outreach

Where can I find homeless youth drop-in centers?

Drop-in centers offer services such as food, laundry, clothing vouchers, a safe place to hang out, HIV/STD testing, medical services, counseling educational/vocational programs, and resource advocacy. The Broadway Youth Center offers programming and leadership opportunities for LGBTQ young people and/or young people experiencing homelessness and housing instability, ages 12-24. Where can I find people doing outreach to homeless youth?

Street outreach programs provide youth with basic services such as access to food and hygiene supplies. The Night Ministry provides outreach at the corner of Belmont & Halsted Tu/Th 8:30pm-10:30pm. The Teen Living Program provides outreach at various times and locations on the south side—call 866-803-8336 and Press "0".

You will need to <u>meet with youth outreach staff</u> to be added to the wait list, which can be done at an outreach site or the main office.

Rather than being a "first-come, first-serve" waitlist, it is based on a household's need for housing. Not all programs use the CRS, but many do.
